But it was only a matter of time. After their second place finish to Temperance Bedford in last year's state finals, members of the Lake Orion varsity wrestling team "planted the seed" that grew into the first state championship in the history of Lake Orion High School.

The team had gathered for a meeting in their Battle Creek hotel room and made a pact among themselves vowing to take home the crown in 1990. Nobody wanted to be number one more than the dragons. The team's commitment to their motto "Live the Dream" intensified from that point on. Even during the summer, the wrestlers (with nine returning starters) grappled in free-style matches and spent some time at coach Tim Fagan's home regrouping their efforts and setting even higher goals. After long hours of practice the season began, and they soon began their climb to the summit. After the first week, they became Oakland County champs. They then suffered a frustrating loss to archrival Bedford during the second week, but it seemed to give the team strength. They went on to win nine of 13 weight categories to capture their own Orion Invitational along with an

The last Day of February brought all three Orion fire stations out in full force.

Citizens object to solid waste landfill plan during hearing

Over one million people live in Oakland County. About 400 of them showed up March 1 at the Board of Commissioners Auditorium for a public hearing on the Oakland County Solid Waste Plan.

The solid waste committee, or 641 committee, is proposing several sites for consideration for the county landfill. Included in the plan is a proposal for a waste to energy incinerator planned for Auburn Hills, just south of Brown Road.

Roger Smith, deputy director of DPW for Oakland County, prefaced the hearing with some background on the solid waste dilemma. Smith told the standing room only crowd that six landfills in the county have a total of four operative years left.

He told the audience that by 1990 yard waste will be prohibited from all landfills.

No one argued that there is a problem with accumulation of waste. Objections came from contingents of residents who felt the 641 commission had not adequately studied the proposed sites or developed uniform siting criteria.

Four members of the 641 committee were present and heard the arguments. There are 23 commissioners. Eight were in attendance at the meeting.

Mike Pudists, of Lake Orion, presented a slide show. Pudists said, "Orion Township is not just a gravel pit. It is a vital residential community. Over 25,000 have chosen it for year round living. We're determined to retain what we've so carefully planned."

Pudists presentation outlined the existing Wayne Disposal, Eagle Valley landfills, General Motors incinerator, and proposed county incinerator in Auburn Hills.

"Auburn Hills is a hostile neighbor to the people of Orion Township," said Pudists.

During Pudists's presentation he pointed out that Orion Township sits over either protected aquifers or aquifers of unknown origin. He expressed concern about the probable groundwater contamination a reaching landfill would cause.

Remove all legislators, group says

It's an election year, and what better time for a new strategy by a group of frustrated taxpayers?  
The Oakland County Taxpayers Association has introduced a new offensive for the 1990 campaign. Dubbed VCR, the initials stand for "vote, cut and remove." OCTA is calling for nothing less than the removal of the entire Michigan legislature this year.  
In its latest press release, the group compares the legislature to a 44cancer" in Lansing, and recommends "direct surgery" by removing the senators and representatives. "What we have found is there is a problem but nobody seems to know the solution," said the group's public relations leader, Stanley Lechert, of Oxford Township. The group is active in Oxford, Orion, Addison, Oakland, Brandon and Independence townships.  
Lechert said voter apathy has allowed the status quo to continue in Michigan. To help counteract that, he recommends filing for absentee ballots as a way to get more voters to the polls.  
"It seems to me the easiest way to get people to vote is to make it easy for them," he said. "My approach is to mail

t aggressi'tl e  
them the absentee ballot, if they're registered, and chances are you'll get it back."  
Lechert said OCTA now boasts some 400-1 members, though it hasn't always been easy to must support as it makes it's way around the townships.  
"It's been pitiful sometimes, 25 people come, so times 50," he said. "I've been fighting since 1970. I've seen how rotten the system is."  
Lechert got his start in Hamtramck, and if a recent Oxford Township meeting is any indication, people are listening to what he has learned in 71 years of political activism. He received an ovation after he spoke about the importance of preserving downtown Oxford at the last board of trustees meeting.  
The next move for OCTA is a meeting Thursday March 8 at the American Legion Hall, 130 E Drahnert Oxford to explain how to appeal property tax assessments. Residents from all over north Oakland County are invited there is no charge for the meeting, which begins at 7:30 p.m.  
The meeting will also be an appeal for members, and an explanation of OCTA's plans for the upcoming elections.  
"The only thing that's permanent is change," Lechert said.

The recent decision of Judge Marvin Stempien on the city utility tax provides an important opportunity to review the state's policy in this area. The legislature regularly includes "sunset" or expiration dates in legislation. This is a valid practice because there are certain laws or policies which are best suited for only a short time or which warrant future review.

injunction or legislation-must recognize a few acts. Government is not bound to levy any tax.

Tax increases in particular are government policies which should be made cautiously and for the shortest time possible. The legislature in 1970 recognized this and stipulated that the utility tax would expire in 1972. The expiration was pushed back five separate times with the final expiration date being June 30, 1988.

Government properly levies a tax when it makes responsible use of the revenue. Therefore, any movement to reinstate the utility tax must be accompanied by the recognition and requirement that it will only be used for essential services.

However, as the case made clear, this tax was collected even after the last expiration date because of an attorney General opinion that the legislation drafting the final expiration date was flawed. Now, Judge Stempien has essentially stated that the legislature intended for this tax to end despite the precise language in the legislation.

The statute which provided for the utility tax stipulated that the majority of the tax must fund police officers. Any proposal for reinstating this tax without at least this provision should be rejected out of hand.

Since this tax was collected for several months without legal authorization, that revenue really belongs to those who paid it. At this point, there is discussion of an injunction to allow the collections to continue. There is also the matter of whether or not the tax should be revived through action at the state level. These are valid questions.

Additionally, the sudden loss of this tax, and the potential shortfall in revenue raises ever louder the call for a responsible use of tax revenue in the City of Detroit.

There is no question that the utility tax has provided a very large amount of revenue to the City of Detroit for many years.

No reinstatement of this tax should be considered until a commitment to sound fiscal management is made. Even simply assuring that money will go for "police" has not prevented abuses and these must end.

There is also no question that specific policy decisions by the city have diverted scarce funds to questionable programs and undermined voter confidence. The Chrysler-Jefferson project the expansion of Detroit City Airport, the ownership of the city jet, the ongoing subsidy to the Downtown People Mover and the various complaints about smaller expenses have done much to damage the credibility of the city's stewardship.

Finally, over the past several years there has often been the attitude in Michigan that the problems of Detroit were only Detroit's. Now, the rest of us need to realize our role in reviving the city. At the same time, when Detroit asks for state action, it must offer something in return. The new City Council has made encouraging statements about fiscal reform. These policies and hold action must accompany any revision of this tax.

Detroit's citizens, like citizens everywhere, want and need a few basic services most. The assurance that a policeman stands guard or that an ambulance will soon arrive is at the heart of a government's responsibility.

 School staff puts in extra hours

A lot of extra hours are being put in by staff members of Lake Orion High School. Under, the direction of teachers Ella Modell and Louann Kraff and the guidance of Richard Kast, LOHS principal, the entire staff is being organized into committees. The committees are necessary to complete the intensive self-study section of thenorth Central Accreditation. Accreditation by the North Central association assures the public that schools undergo periodic inspection and adhere to certain standards. According to Kast, schools must become reaccredited every seven years. The first phase of this procedure is a self-evaluation. After the committees have completed their reports, a copy is compiled of all them. The North Central committee studies this and the following year conducts an on-site visit. Modell said. "Everyone tries to act natural when the team visits." The final outcome brings one of three results. The

status was a result of financial cutbacks, not curricula or academic programming. One advantage of accreditation is being among the better schools. Graduates from an accredited high school may be given the edge on college admissions. Modell said there are 23 committees in progress at LOHS. There is a steering committee, co-chaired by Modell and Krall. There are general committees and the departmental ones. Each of the 90 staff members at the high school is required to serve on one or more committee. Each committee is composed of between three to six people. The committees have been meeting before and after school on a weekly basis. Often the instructors choose not to review a committee within their own discipline. "We get a lot of feedback from persons on the staff. It is interesting to work with others," said Modell. Kast @grees. He said, "It pulls the staff together as well as the administration." The general committees are: philosophy and goals, school and community, curriculum other programs, learning media center, auxiliary services. School staff

school either maintains accreditation, is placed on probation, or is dropped from the association. Schools are required to file one year and three year follow-up reports. These reports document any changes affected as a result of the accrediting team's recommendations.

Each school:year Kast is required to file a report on status of teachers, their graduate study hours, new hires, number of students and other pertinent data. These annual updates maintain the accredited status.

Principal Kast said that LOHS has been a member of North Central since 1927. In the 11 years he has been at LOHS the school was placed on probation only once. This was in the early '80s and Kast said the probationary

and administration, student activities program, guidance services and publicity.

The departmental committees reflect the structure of the curriculum. They are math, art, music, science, and social studies. Special education, trade and industry, language arts, home economics, health and physical education, foreign language and business education round out the departmental committees.

On Feb. 28 Modell and Krall presented a finalized report of the philosophy and goals and school and community committees to the school board. At this time they will also update the board on the other committees activities. When the self study is completed volumes of results will be forwarded to the North Central Association.
